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


SCRIBED BY WALDO EMERSON TO DAVID THOREAU





1838 BOSTON



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In December 2021, the Providence Athenæum received a remarkable gift from the world-renowned Susan Jaffe Tane Collection of Nineteenth-Century American Authors - a collection of books, essays, poems, and letters by Ralph Waldo Emerson and Henry David Thoreau. This is the largest single contribution to the library's Special Collections in a century.

These rare and unique materials, much sought after by collectors and institutions, provide significant historical context and represent critical commentary on the social, cultural, and economic turbulence of their century in American history. The acquisition enhances the library's existing strengths in nineteenth-century literature and further positions the Athenæum as an institution of national significance.

Emphasizing the library's "outstanding stewardship," Ms. Tane remarks, "This gift solidifies the Athenæum's anchoring position in a consortium of regional resources of major literary accomplishments by authors of this period and [as] the remarkable cultural incubator spawned in the original founding colonies."

The Athenæum is deeply grateful for Ms. Tane's friendship, generosity, and trust and is honored to bring part of her extraordinary collection to Rhode Island.

An exceptional association copy linking Thomas Carlyle with his two most important American admirers, Emerson and Thoreau. Presentation copy from Emerson to Thoreau, inscribed in volume 1: "Henry D. Thoreau from R. Waldo Emerson" and with the ownership inscription of "Henry D. Thoreau" in volume 2.

(12 parts, original pink wrappers). *The chief journal of the Transcendentalists,* The Dial, was revived for a single year in 1860 by Moncure D. Conway and included an article entitled "Domestic Life" by Emerson.

Emerson, Ralph Waldo. Autograph letter signed to Oliver Wendell Holmes.

Concord, [Massachusetts], May 7, 1866. 3 pages. Emerson writes eloquently of his enthusiasm regarding a new magazine, a "literary fellowship of three countries." He believes Holmes and James Russell Lowell are well chosen to direct the American end of a new magazine project.

EMERSON, RALPH WALDO. AUTOGRAPH LETTER TO FRANK B. SANBORN. Concord, [Massachusetts], November 19,

Signed by Emerson twice ("R. W. Emerson" and "RWE"), with original envelope. Emerson writes to the journalist and author, Sanborn, regarding his desperate search for a missing poem.








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

THOREAU, HENRY DAVID. Autograph manuscript from *The Maine Woods* ("Ktaadn").

[1840s]. 6 pages. Drafts of material from the opening and closing of the essay "Ktaadn." It consists of significant reworking, additions, and deletions.

THOREAU, HENRY DAVID. AUTOGRAPH MANUSCRIPT РОЕМ, "INSPIRATION." [1841]. 3 ½ pages,

21 stanzas. Thoreau attributes inspiration not to his senses, learning, or mortal experience but rather to the transcendental experience of the divine force.

[THOREAU, HENRY DAVID] PEABODY, ELIZABETH P., EDITOR. AESTHETIC PAPERS. Boston: The Editor [John Wilson], 1849. 1st ed. Unbound sheets, unsewn, uncut, unopened. Contains the first printing of Thoreau's "Resistance to Civil Government," better known as "Civil Disobedience."

THOREAU, HENRY DAVID. A WEEK ON THE CONCORD AND MERRIMACK RIVERS. Boston & Cambridge: James Munroe & Co., 1849. 1st ed. Inscribed by the publisher in ink: "Editor of Mercantile Journal with Publisher's regards." Text corrected by Thoreau in three places. Presentation binding; brown cloth in elaborately stamped format.

THOREAU, HENRY DAVID. AUTOGRAPH MANUSCRIPT PORTION FROM THE FINAL DRAFT OF "CHESUNCOOK." [1853-57]. Thoreau's final draft for a piece published in The Atlantic Monthly, 1858. Docketed on the verso by publisher, James Russell Lowell.

THOREAU, HENRY DAVID. WALDEN; OR, LIFE IN THE WOODS. Boston: Ticknor & Fields, 1854.1st ed. Publisher's blind-stamped brown cloth and gilt spine title. Includes lithographed map of Walden. Bookplate of Frederic R. Kirkland. George William Curtis, signature on flyleaf.

The first 12 verses of his 20-verse poem. Inscribed by Thoreau to his student, "Master George W. Sewall."

THOREAU, HENRY DAVID / THOREAU, SOPHIA. HANDWRITTEN MANUSCRIPT. "BROTHER WHERE DOST THOU DWELL." [no date.] 2 pages.

Poem by Henry David Thoreau in the hand of his sister, Sophia. The inscription above the poem, "To John Thoreau – by his brother Henry," is handwritten by Thoreau.


